Each new member must sign the club's Assumption of Risk Waiver and will pay an annual \$69.00 fee which is used for land use and club events. We all met at Arthur's for a delicious breakfast. In the meantime I get a text from the Sloan's stating that they have a dead battery on the Jeep



There are times when you might find your recreation taking you to remote locations. Your friends may or may not be with you. You travel beyond the cell networks and disappear into the natural landscape for a day or a week. How do you let someone know you are either OK - on schedule, OK - but being delayed, or you have had a major problem and you need HELP fast? There is a portable GPS device that you can take with you that communicates your messages UP to a satellite and reflects them back down to a terrestrial receiver connected to the cellular network. You decide what the message will say, and who will receive the messages as a text message on their cell phone. Messages are delivered in about 1 minute or less. Let me introduce you to the "SPOT Gen-3" device.

The message sent may say that you are OK, or you need assistance, a Latitude / Longitude are sent with each message. Tracks are also sent with basic subscription at 10 min intervals

with Lat / Lon as well. A web site will show your tracks with satellite photo pin points. The reason I mention this is because I have one, and a couple other IE4W members have one as well, we all need to know how to handle the messages.

If you are knowledgeable of how to use a laptop computer that is connected to the Internet, you may be asked in the future to be a receiver of a SPOT message. You may be asked because you might be staying in camp during the day a run is made and you would be the direct connection for those out on the trail. You will have to be able to locate the member needing help by the Lat/Lon and to provide directions or information as necessary to those in camp who will be responding to help.
